#### 2. Welcome Week

During both the fall 2003 and the spring 2004 semesters, a series of events were planned to welcome new and returning students to campus. Welcome Week events were expanded in FY04, as compared to FY03, to include events each day during the first two weeks of classes and were both social and educational in nature. Events included:

**Fall 2003** – free ice cream, study skills workshop, WILD 97.9 broadcast, Alcohol Awareness information, student organizations' fair, career planning workshop, free massages and a blood drive.

**Spring 2004 –** free hot chocolate, tye-dye t-shirts, play station games, star flicks, student organizations' fair, singer TJ McLoud, mentalist Banachek, laser tag and a story teller.

# 3. Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program

Student Life, in conjunction with the federal Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program, coordinated efforts to provide free tax preparation assistance to students, faculty, staff and the Oklahoma City area community. Approximately 859 individuals were assisted and all forms were submitted electronically. The VITA site was offered from February 2 through April 15, 2004 on Monday through Thursdays from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

## 4. Voter Registration Campaign

In collaboration with The Leadership Council and the Campus Activities Board, three formal voter registration campaigns were held on campus in September 2003, November 2003 and in March 2004. Approximately 225 students were registered to vote during the formal campaigns. In addition, voter registration materials are available through the Office of Student Life on an on-going basis. Approximately 690 students were registered through the informal process.

#### 5. Educational Lecture Series

Five lecturers were invited to campus throughout the year to speak to a variety of issues. Lecturers included:

## **Surviving The Holocaust**

Lecturer Nesse Godin, Thursday, October 23, College Union 1, 2 and 3 at 3 p.m. Nesse Godin was born in Shauliai, Lithuania, where she lived with her family until the Nazi invasion. Nesse is a survivor of the Shauliai, Lithuania Ghetto, the Stutthof Concentration Camp, four labor camps and a death march. After the war, in 1950, she and her husband, Jack, also a survivor, came to the United States and settled in the Washington, DC area. Nesse has now dedicated her adult life to teaching and sharing memories of the Holocaust.

# The Obligations of Journalists

Lecturer Jeffery Dvorkin, Thursday, November 6, College Union 2 and 3 at 3 p.m. Jeffery Dvorkin is the Ombudsman at National Public Radio. He acts as the listeners' agent inside NPR and gives feedback and criticism to NPR journalists and programs on behalf of the audience. Mr. Dvorkin has been a journalist and broadcaster for more than 20 years. He has reported from London, Amsterdam, Prague, Budapest and Eastern Europe during the fall of communism. Mr. Dvorkin lectures on issues of accountability and responsibility in journalism and draws from his wealth of experience as a reporter.

## **African Rhythms & The African-American Connection**

Lecturer Al Bostick, Tuesday, February 24, College Union 2 and 3 at 12:30 p.m. Al Bostick will bring to life the rich culture of African rhythms and the connections to the current African American heritage.

#### **Bioterrorism and Bioethics**

Lecturer Dr. David Magnus, Tuesday, March 9, College Union 1, 2 & 3 at 3 p.m.

David Magnus, PhD is currently the Graduate Studies Director and professor of bioethics at the Center for Bioethics at the University of Pennsylvania. A leading scholar in his field, Dr. Magnus has appeared on Good Morning America, CBS This Morning and FOX news Sunday. His lecture addresses the threat of bioterrorism and the ethical challenges for the health care system and for the way science is regulated. Should we limit the research that may lead to easy access to deadly pathogens? Or should we increase spending on research in the hopes that the technology that creates these problems is our best defense? **Nurses Without Borders** 

Lecturer Mary Lightfine, Monday, March 29, College Union 1, 2 and 3 at 3 p.m. After working as a nurse in emergency rooms throughout the United States, Mary Lightfine, a self-professed adrenaline junkie, joined an organization called Doctors Without Borders. Since this life changing decision, she has lived in more than a dozen countries, including some of the most horrific places on earth, from the anarchy of Mogodishu to the refugee camps in Kosovo. Her lecture will give you the human story behind the news articles.

## 6. Community Service Projects

Sixteen community service related projects and activities were held throughout the year, with 2,844 participants, which was a 260% increase in the number of activities and a 860% increase in the number of participants compared to FY03. Highlighted service projects included:

**Blood Drives** – In collaboration with the Oklahoma Blood Institute, there were 5 two-day blood drives held on campus. Average participation per drive was 65 donations.

**Campus Adopt-A-Space** – Student organizations were solicited to adopt one of twenty seven lounge areas across campus, which they would maintain throughout the academic year. Twelve student clubs participated. Signs marked each space with the club's name and College logo.

**Habitat for Humanity Work Day** – Two habitat for humanity work days were scheduled, one was cancelled due to inclement weather. 15 students participated in the October 2003 work day.

**Family Halloween Carnival** – Student organizations worked in collaboration with the Office of Student Life and the Campus Activities Board to set up games and activities for children in the community.

**Canned Food Drive** – A canned food and clothing drive was held in November 2003 as part of National Family Week. Donations collected from students, faculty and staff were donated to the Loving Hands, Inc.

**Gear Up Mentorship** – In collaboration with The Leadership Council, the Office of Student Life and Enrollment Management students were paired with area atrisk high school students. The goal of the one-day event was to introduce area high school students to the college environment and provide role models for success.

**Spring Family Carnival** - Student organizations worked in collaboration with the Office of Student Life and the Campus Activities Board to set up games and activities for children in the community during the Easter weekend.

## 7. Educational Programs

In addition to the educational lecture series, twenty-nine educational events were hosted throughout the academic year, with a total attendance of 5,007 students, a 425% increase in activities and a 575% increase in attendance compared to FY03. Highlighted programs included:

**Study Skills Workshop** – A workshop on effective study skills was facilitated by Mary Turner, a counselor in the Center for Student Development in August 2003. **Career Exploration Workshop** – A workshop concerning selecting a major field of study was facilitated by Mary Turner, a counselor in the Center for Student Development, in August 2003.

**National Day of Remembrance** – Students involved in the Campus Activities Board provided voter registration information and provided an opportunity for students, faculty and staff to write their thoughts about "what it means to be an American" on a large poster displayed in the College Union.

**Veteran's Day** – Student involved in the Campus Activities Board sponsored a voter registration drive and provided political information bookmarks in recognition of Veteran's Day.

**Story Teller** – Two storytellers were hosted on campus to provide educational entertainment in the College Union in November 2003 as part of National Family Week and in February 2004 as part of Oklahoma City's Wintertales celebration. **World AIDS Day** – Students involved in the Campus Activities Board sponsored an information booth in December 2003 to raise awareness about AIDS related issues.

**Art Display & Competition** – All students were solicited to enter their artwork (poetry, graphic design, paintings, drawings and photography) into a competition. Angel Cruz was awarded first place with his sketch entitled "Change."

**Alcohol Awareness Booth** – Students were afforded an opportunity to experience the Alcohol 101 CD produced by The Century Council to educate students on the responsible use of alcohol.

New Student Politics Teleconference – Oklahoma City Community College served as a host site for a national teleconference sponsored by Campus Compact as part of the state regent's civic engagement campaign. The goal of the teleconference was to define political involvement and discuss how to get more college students involved in their local, state and national government.

#### 8. Social Events

# 9. Council for the Advancement of Standards in Higher Education Self Assessment

In February 2004 the Office of Student Life conducted an internal assessment using the Council for the Advancement of Standards (CAS) in Higher Education instrument. The CAS instrument was designed by hundreds of professionals in higher education and is designed to set a standard of best educational practice. Two primary areas were targeted for assessment: Campus Activities and Student Leadership Programs. The instrument evaluates each aspect of an area on a scale between exemplary and not met. After completing the instrument, areas that may be considered exemplary and those where needed improvement was necessary were determined. Goals, objectives and activities for FY05 were partially based on the results. Findings are as follows:

#### SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES TO SUPPORT AND ACCOMPLISH GOALS:

## 1. Sponsors' Recognition Projects

A number of activities and events were held throughout the year to recognize, thank and motivate our club sponsors who volunteer so much of their time and

energy to assist our student organizations. Activities throughout the year included:

**Sponsors' Newsletter** – A total of seven editions of the sponsor's newsletter was published between August 2003 and May 2004. The newsletter is titled "The Extra Mile" and serves as a method of communication, a resource guide and a source of motivation for club sponsors.

**Sponsors' Luncheon** – In August of 2003 a luncheon was held in honor of all club sponsors to thank them for their past efforts and to become motivated in preparation for the upcoming year.

**Sponsors' Appreciation Week –** In November of 2003 a week was set aside to recognize and give appreciation to the club sponsors. The Office of Student Life sent out cards and small gifts to each sponsor. Student organizations were given a card for members to sign and give to their sponsors, as well as encouraged to think of creative and individualized ways to thank their sponsors.

**Souper Sponsors** – In February 2004 the Office of Student Life sent each club sponsor an individual can of soup with an attached note of appreciation. **Student Organization Jubilee** – At the annual Student Organizations' Jubilee, held in April of 2004, each club sponsor was recognized with a certificate and a key chain, which read "commitment to excellence," for their dedication and volunteer work throughout the year.

## 2. Student Leadership Activities

Four student leadership events were held in 2003-2004. The purpose of such leadership events is to assist in educating and motivating club sponsors and student organization leaders in order that they may achieve success within their individual groups. Leadership events included the Student Leadership Retreat in August 2003, two follow-up Leadership Retreats in September 2003 and the annual Student Leadership Workshop in January 2004. A total of 161 sponsors and student leaders were in attendance at the four events. Each event featured leadership development topics and specific College information regarding the management of a student organization. Two surveys were conducted, one in August of 2003 and the other in January 2004 at the conclusion of the student leadership events. Respondents were asked to rate their answers on a 1 to 5 scale. 1=Strongly Disagree, 2=Disagree, 3=Neutral, 4=Agree, 5=Strongly Agree. In August 2003 75 students and sponsors were in attendance, 56 responded to the survey. 100% indicated they agreed or strongly agreed that "attending the retreat will help me and my club be more successful." In January 2004 51 students and sponsors attended the leadership workshop, 42 responded. 100% indicated they agreed or strongly agreed that "attending the workshop will help their club be more successful."

#### 3. Student Organization Fairs

Two Organization Fairs were held this year, one in August and another in January. The purpose of the organization fairs is to solicit membership in the various student organizations and to promote the formation of new clubs. During the August 2003 Organization Fair, a total of 684 students signed up for club

membership and an additional 451 signed up at the January 2004 Organization Fair.

## 4. Student Awards Ceremony

The annual Student Awards Ceremony was held on April 16, 2004 in the general dining area of the College Union. Approximately 325 faculty, staff, students and community members were in attendance. One hundred and twenty students were recognized during the ceremony for the achievements inside and outside of the classroom. Awards given included the Pioneer Award, the Student Organization Award, the President's Award for Excellence, the English Student Essay Award, scholarship recognition, a Certificate of Achievement and recognition of honors graduates. In addition to the ceremony, a luncheon was held in honor of recipients of the President's Award for Excellence. Students receiving this award and the College's President's Cabinet members were in attendance at the luncheon. President's Award for Excellence recipients, who were participating in the commencement ceremony, were also honored during a reception at the Renaissance Hotel prior to the ceremony. Members of the Board of Regents, special guests and President's Cabinet members were in attendance at the reception.

## 5. Student Organization Jubilee

The Student Organization Jubilee was held on April 30, 2004 in the College's Library. The purpose of the Jubilee is to celebrate and recognize the accomplishments of the student organizations over the past year. The Oklahoma City Community College jazz ensemble provided the entertainment for this year's event. Approximately 40 students and sponsors were in attendance. Awards were given out as follows:

# 6. Student Activities & Recognition Transcript

The Student Activities and Recognition Transcript or S.T.A.R.T. is a tool for students to use to supplement employment and college applications, which assists in demonstrating that the student has the necessary skills and experiences to achieve success. After extensive research and collaboration with various departments at the College, the transcript became a service available to

students in July 2004. The service was marketed to student leaders, at new student orientation sessions and throughout campus via an information brochure. Currently there are 110 students utilizing the service. Current users were surveyed in April 2004. Of those surveyed via a mail in form, 21 responded. Respondents were asked to rate their answers on a 1 to 5 scale. 1=Strongly Disagree, 2=Disagree, 3=Neutral, 4=Agree, 5=Strongly Agree. Of the 21 who responded 74% indicated that they agreed or strongly agreed "the transcript is a useful tool in helping obtain jobs and transfer to other institutions." The remaining 26% indicated a neutral response to this question.

## 7. Online Student Organization Forms

For the second year, the Activity Request Form was available to student organizations via the Student Life web page. All activity requests were made using the updated on-line forms in FY04, as paper forms are no longer available. In addition to the Activity Request Form being available to students online, an upto-the-minute accurate calendar system is available via the Student Life web page, which contains information about all the student organizations' meetings and events. The calendar system also has a unique search feature, which makes it user friendly. During the summer of 2003, all online forms were updated. The goal of the new system is to increase ease of use for students, require more detailed information and improve accuracy in the event planning process. Full implementation of the new request system began in August 2003.

## 8. Student Focus Group

A student focus group was formed in March 2004 to review the student organizations' activity request system and manual. Ten students served on the focus group. Eight students were officers of student clubs and member of The Leadership Council and two students were new members of a student club. The focus group met three times to review materials and provide feedback to Student Life staff. The primary recommendations made by the focus group included:

- 1. More explanation throughout the activity request system.
- 2. More examples of how to complete the forms. (ie. July 1, 2004 or 7/1/2004)
- 3. Detailed information included in the manual regarding completion of an online activity request.

At the conclusion of the focus group meetings, staff in the Office of Student Life met to discuss the recommendation and initiate a plan to update the activity request system and student organizations' manual. A revised online system and manual will be available to students beginning August 2004.

Office of Student Life: Student Clubs & Organizations

#### SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES TO SUPPORT AND ACCOMPLISH GOALS:

#### 1. General Overview

Throughout the year, a total of 31 student organizations were recognized as active, an increase of four student clubs over the course of the academic year.

New student organizations or organizations that were re-organized in FY04 include the Native American Student Association, the Black Student Association, the Biology/Ecology Club, Cinematheque and Alpha Omega. In addition, the Chess Club was removed from the active list.

## 2. Activity Overview

Student organizations held over 165 events throughout the year, with almost triple the attendance compared to FY03. Below is a summary of types of events, number of events held in each category and total number of participants who attended or assisted with events in each category. Information about club activities is based on event summary forms submitted by student leaders.

In addition to club events, over 450 club meetings were held throughout the year.

#### 3. Student Organizations Overview

- ★ **Abilities Galore** met regularly to share information regarding disability related issues and forward them to appropriate areas. Their highlighted activity this year was holding an auction to generate funds for a student scholarship.
- ★ Alpha Omega was a new organization this year. The group met weekly to share in Christian fellowship.
- ★ The **Baptist Collegiate Ministries (BCM)** met each Monday and Thursday for Bible study, to hear special speakers and to worship in song. The group also formed an intramural softball team and planned outreach efforts with the international student population.
- ★ The **Biology and Ecology Club** was a new addition to the club listing this year, replacing the club formally known as the Environmental Science Club. The group formed in Spring 2004 and participated in a number of educational and social field trips.
- ★ The Black Student Association (BSA) met regularly throughout the year. The group assisted the Office of Student Life by hosting a reception for African-American heritage lecturer Al Bostic.
- ★ The Campus Activities Board (CAB) met bi-monthly to discuss and plan activities for the student body. This year's CAB activities included 12 social events, 4 educational events and 3 community service projects on campus.

- ★ Chi Alpha met weekly for Bible study, outreach and Christian music. This active group also did outreach by staffing an information table on multiple dates in the College Union foyer.
- ★ The **Child Development Club** is in the process of reorganization, but held 4 club meetings and coordinated a reading awareness program in March 2004.
- ★ Christians on Campus met bi-monthly for in depth Bible study and discussion. Information tables were set up throughout September 2003 to display information, answer questions and to invite new students to join the organization.
- ★ The Cinematheque Society was re-organized this year. The group met monthly and planned a number of educational speakers on campus. The highlighted event for the year was a speaker who had worked with graphic design and animation on the movie "The Matrix."
- ★ College Republicans met monthly to discuss and plan activities to promote the Republican political party.
- ★ The Computer-Aided Design Society (CADS) met regularly throughout the year. This organization planned 15 game days, for students to come together and discuss their coursework while also socializing and playing computer games.
- ★ The **Drama Club** was inactive throughout the year and are currently in the process of rebuilding their group.
- ★ Engineering Club (E-Club) met regularly to listen to speakers and discuss trends in the field of engineering. This year the group's annual book sale fundraiser brought in proceeds totaling over \$1,500. These funds were raised for the Jack Cain Memorial Scholarship fund, which benefited a number of Oklahoma City Community College students. In addition, the group participated in many community service projects, including working with a mentorship program through the Oklahoma City public school system.
- ★ The Gay And Lesbian Alliance (GALA) was an active group throughout the year, as they met regularly and planned a number of educational events including HIV testing, National Condom Week and an AIDS walk.
- ★ The **Health Professions Club** hosted several guest speakers, including a speaker from the Allied School of Health (OUHSC). This group went on many field trips relating to a variety of health careers and also participated in 2 community service projects.
- ★ The Hispanic Organization to Promote Education (HOPE) met regularly and was extremely active. The highlighted event for the year was their monthly outreach and mentorship efforts with Rockwood Elementary School. In addition, the students attended NCLR during June of 2004.
- ★ International Association of Administrative Professionals (IAAP) is a professional organization for students involved in the office administration academic department.
- ★ The International Student Association met regularly throughout the year, to plan social and educational events. The group's activities included an Asian food sale and a volleyball tournament.

- ★ **Literary Excursions** is a group that meets regularly to socialize and discuss all forms of literature. The group held a total of 8 discussions throughout the year.
- ★ The Native American Student Association was re-organized and added to the list of organizations in the Spring of 2004. The group met regularly and has begun plans for the upcoming year.
- ★ Oklahoma Biotechnology Association met regularly to listen to guest speakers who were invited to share and educate on the field of biotechnology. A number of field trips were also taken to actively engage students in current trends and research related to biotechnology.
- ★ The Oklahoma Nursing Students' Association (OSNA) met monthly and attended the Oklahoma Nursing Students Association Fall Convention. The year was wrapped up with the annual Nurses' Pinning Ceremony. The group also held a very successful silent auction to raise money for club activities and scholarships.
- ★ PASS with CLASS was inactive throughout the year, but the club sponsors are currently working with the Office of Student Life to solicit leadership for the group during FY2005.
- ★ Phi Theta Kappa's (PTK)-Alpha Theta Alpha participated in 12 community service projects and 6 educational events during the year. In addition, this highly motivated group also participated in regional and national conferences to assist students in gaining necessary leadership skills.
- ★ The **Photography Club** met regularly and participated in field trips and community service projects related to the field of photography.
- ★ Psi Beta and the Psychology/Sociology Club had a great year. The group met regularly and planned a number of educational events for students.
- ★ Scholar's League met monthly to plan social activities, which bring Scholar's League students together.

colleges/universities, and every program of post-secondary study offered in Oklahoma. Also included are extensive lists of public and private financial aid sources as well as Oklahoma wages and projections. Students may create their own portfolios to save information and make notes. It is updated annually.

College Central Network – was contracted and opened to register local employers with job opportunities for students and alumni. Jobs are listed as full-time, part-time, degree required, and internships. Since March, 257 employers have registered listing a total of 463 jobs with 137 currently open. Employers are approved through the E.S. office and have the option of listing their own jobs and searching student resumes or having the office list for them. Students may register and search jobs from any location and have the option of uploading resumes which are also approved by the E.S. office.
