Conventions and Mechanics	Executes proper organization, content, presentation, formatting, stylistic choices, and grammar with minor errors.	Executes appropriate organization, content, presentation, and stylistic choices. Contains minimal grammar and mechanics that do not significantly impede meaning.	Does not execute a consistent system for basic organization and presentation. Includes excessive grammar and mechanical errors that impedes meaning.
